# **Staying Inspired**

Robin D. Mackey, a friend of my eldest son, Van Johnson, since they both transferred from different small schools to Pleasant Valley High School. Robin was a very impressive teenager and has grown into a very impressive woman who makes a positive difference in the lives of "at risk parents and children." The following are Robin's inspirational thoughts, written especially for the Steel Magnolias Newsletter.

#### **Staying Inspired**

Inspiration is what I depend on to get me going most days. That doesn't mean it's easy to write something inspirational for others. In fact, writing for the Steel Magnolias newsletter has given me opportunity to think anew about how we stay inspired to reach out to others and support them.

I once heard, I believe on the Paul Harvey show, that faith is believing in fast forward, what only makes sense in reverse. This phrase has stuck with me as I have looked back over the moments in my life which were turning points. For the sake of this article, I have divided these moments into three types: 1) Epiphany moments 2) "This" moment and 3) Ester moments.

My first Epiphany moment came about 25 years ago. I was 21 years old and standing in my apartment in Tokyo, Japan, getting ready to go to my job at Tokyo Baptist Church. I had been feeling a lot of pressure to figure out what I should do with my life. In an instant that morning, I realized that if I just committed to serving others, I would always have meaningful work that would make people's lives better. It worked! For the past 25 years, my faith has led me to service opportunities which have enriched my life and my faith. I have had jobs I loved and volunteer opportunities to help people and support causes which are dear to my heart. When I feel exhausted and ready to give up, I try to serve. It doesn't have to be big. I might call a neighbor, give a sincere compliment or pray for someone else.

**This moment** is the name I have given those times in life when all of our attention and energy are poured into living the single second we are experiencing at a particular time. For me these moments are too far apart. I would like to live every moment this way. My inspiration for living in "this" moment comes from my precious nephew, Tanner. Tanner is 7 years old now, but when he was 4 years old, he went to the doctor on a Saturday morning with a cough. From that doctor's appointment he was airlifted to Children's Hospital, where he was diagnosed with T-cell lymphoma. He finished treatments in September, 2014 and will get his port out April 16, 2015.

What struck me most about his illness was how quickly Tanner's parents

I know much of their ability to cope was due to the incredible outpouring of love and support they received from others. However, I also know that witnessing Tanner, living in the moment, was what got them through the toughest times. Amid hospitalizations, treatments, nausea and trips to Birmingham, Tanner just kept right on playing video games, swimming when he could, and learning all the stuff kindergartners learn. Tanner lives in the moment. I try to do that too—though it is not easy!

**Ester moments**, are those times when we look at our circumstances and believe we are there for a reason. Just like Ester from the Old Testament, who found herself in a position to save her people, we find ourselves faced with responsibilities which might seem too big for us, yet we know they give us an opportunity to do something that matters. My biggest Ester moments came while my husband was a pastor. Being a pastor's wife provided ample Ester moments! The Steel Magnolias Support Group is no doubt, the direct result of several Ester moments. Ester moments stretch us to be better as we serve others.

This spring, take time to enjoy each of these moments in your own life. Epiphanies can happen every day, if we seek them. Living in the moment is one of the richest gifts we can give ourselves and those around us. Ester moments help us to see the role we play in God's larger plan of serving and loving others.

"Get well quick..... from the nurse you gave a ticket to last week."




