Project Hope

Project Hope was a luncheon, catered by Classic on Noble. It was also an opportunity for organizations to let the public know more about what services are available in our community. The keynote speaker was, Atlanta based, American Cancer Society, PHD, Ms. Donella Wilson. Ms. Wilson was expected to speak about the latest in treatment for the five most diagnosed cancers in Calhoun and surrounding counties. The event sponsored by RMC Memorial Foundation, RMC, Medical Alliance, and the American Cancer Society, was a really great information fair and luncheon. Frankly, there was disappointment with the American Cancer Society presentation. We really heard little about what was advertised.

Ms. Wilson's presentation traced the American Cancer Society research program since 1946. The most current breast cancer drug mentioned was Tamoxofin. Almost all breast cancer patients know that the aromotase inhibitors, Arimidex and Femera, drugs that prevent the production of estrogen, are now preferred over Tamoxofin, whose function is to block estrogen from the cells of the body. We also heard nothing about Herceptin. Herceptin is given to patients who test positive for the HER2/neu gene, and is considered a real break through in the prevention of recurrence. We really can't comment on skin, colon, prostate or lung cancer.

Ms. Wilson confirmed our belief, that Steel Magnolias is concentrating our efforts in the best possible place. She must have repeated the need for early detection a dozen times, followed by "Have I said it 10 times yet?" In spite of all the advances in the treatment of cancer, our best hope of beating cancer is still early diagnosis.

Last year the local organizations, RMC Memorial Foundation, RMC and Medical Alliance sponsored "Project Heart." We salute them for these wonderful educational luncheons; they host to inform the community about new treatments for some of society's most feared diseases.
