From Challenge To Victory

Last month's newsletter was the most difficult I've ever written. I tried every possible way to find another subject, but couldn't get away from Chaplain Wilson's comment. In late summer of 2001, before writing the first newsletter, I told Chaplain Wilson, "I feel that a newsletter needs to be a part of this new support group but how will I know what to write?" The Chaplain's answer was, "If the newsletter is God's work, He will show you what to write." The September newsletter was the 122nd letter since 2001.

I remember writing a letter in October of 2003, and after including an inspirational page, experiencing a flicker in the electric power. In an instance the page was gone. I was not a happy camper! I walked into other parts of the house and realized that none of our clocks were affected. I then said, "Well, God, I don't think you liked my choice. Show me what to include." I then decided on a poem I'd written when my sons were very young. At the next group meeting, Marilyn McCormack, a young mother, in treatment for breast cancer, who had small children, thanked me for the poem. She had just watched a movie on HG TV about a young mother with stage 4 breast cancer who feared she would be leaving her babies. Marilyn said, "I took that poem from the newsletter and it is on my refrigerator."

The poem begins:

I gaze into the faces of my babies, living in their worlds of tranquil fantasies.

Ouestions race through my mind, When

you are men, what life will you find?

No doubt the poem was for Marilyn.

Now back to the September 2012 newsletter. On Monday, September 17, the day the Steel Magnolias Newsletter went on line, I received this email from Ted Nail, the blind man who made history by being the oldest blind man to ever earn a degree from JSU. Then several semesters at Louisiana Tech., but had to drop out before earning a masters. Ted came back to Birmingham, Alabama. He applied for a few jobs where his blindness would not be an issue. He became discouraged but continued to seek employment, and did go to work for Disability Rights and Resources.

His message after reading September's newsletter was: "Ms. Lenora, Thanks for sharing in your last newsletter for September. I truly felt your emotions you shared with the rest of us. Just by listening to what you had to say, I could feel as if I were 10 years old again. While I listened, I felt such a peace come over me at how God gave you the peace to put down into words how you felt at this period in your life. It is truly good friends and sisters in the Lord, like you that show boldness in times like we are facing today. Keep up the great work, I am so proud of all the STEEL men and women in Calhoun County. Love Ya, Ted"

Life Is Worth Living!


Very early, Saturday, September 29, I emailed Ted, asking permission to publish his incredible story. His response was, "Of course you can, I also wanted you to know: "This past Wednesday, I was voted the Treasurer for AL DAN. I have some ideas about how we can get more people signed up, and this can be done with organizations, or individuals. Everyone on the board has some kind of disability. I so happen to be the first blind person to hold a position. God is always surprising me on what He can do, if we will let Him."

Little is much when God is in it!

I can do everything through Him who gives me strength. Philippians 4:13

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "Plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29:11

Why write about blindness when I founded a breast cancer support/service organization? It is simple, the writing is about the loss of our emotional and mental compass, and finding a way to reclaim our life. The first step is the acceptance of that loss, whether it be from cancer or an inherited condition like Ted's blindness. We must accept our new normal. Family members want us back as we were before we were consumed with loss. In time our new normal is accepted by most family members. As painful as it is to feel a disconnect, while struggling for our new normal, it is possible to recover, and see ourselves become stronger and more focused. A short poem I wrote concerning the struggle to feel whole again goes like this:
