At Steel Magnolias March meeting, we were delighted by yet another season of ripples, produced by God's midsummer 2007 fountain. Jeanne, walked into the Galley at the Tyler Center and introduced herself, "I'm Jeanne, I'm Claire's mom."

In July of 2007, Ms. Canada, walked into Warren Family Affair, with jewelry needing repair. While in Marti Warren's shop, Ms. Canada saw the Steel Magnolias' poster, prompting her to tell Marti about her niece, Claire, a young woman who grew up in Anniston, now living in Pelham.

Claire, married hardly more than a year, had been diagnosed with breast cancer. Marti told this aunt about Steel Magnolias' care package ministry and asked about contacting Claire.

On March 1, 2007, I mailed care packages to Claire, accompanied by a personal letter. This contact with Claire made ripples that touched the lives of other young breast cancer patients. The first was Lena.

November 27, 2007:

Dear Claire, I am mailing care packages to a 28 year old, mother of two, Lena, who lives in Empire. She needs to speak to a breast cancer patient close to her age.

And so it began! Ripples have touched the lives of several other young women in Jefferson/
Shelby county. In the summer of 2008, the Birmingham News published an article about Claire's group of accomplished women, all in their twenties, all breast cancer survivors.

Marti asked Jeanne how it felt to be told your daughter has breast cancer. Before Jeanne told her story, there was a deep sigh. Sometimes words are not enough to express anguish. Jeanne closed her statement with, "We never want anything to happen to our children."

In honor of her daughter, Claire, Jeanne is now a member of Steel Magnolias.

Marti Rogers is a Steel Magnolias member, serving in memory of her mother.

And so the river flows from heart to heart as we work to support the newly diagnosed, educate the not yet diagnosed, and love each other as we continue our individual journeys as survivors.

A river is never still, there are fountains that constantly feed the river, sometimes to overflowing. In Montgomery, thanks to the channels that have flowed from so many in Alabama, wanting April 20, 2009

Fite's Bill To Improve Cancer Treatment for Women Passes House

Montgomery, AL - Representative Lea Fite's (D-Jacksonville) bill to improve cancer treatment for women passed the House of Representatives this week.

"Providing cancer treatment is the difference between life and death for women. This bill will increase coverage for low-income women, and it closes a loophole that has kept Medicaid from covering treatment in the past," said Fite.

The purpose of the bill is to increase treatment coverage of breast and cervical cancer for women who qualify for Medicaid. Under the current law, Medicaid only covers treatment if women are diagnosed at a federally funded clinic. The bill would expand coverage for women who are diagnosed at other health care providers.

"As the husband of a breast cancer survivor, I know how terrible it is for families who have to go through this. We had good insurance, and I don't know how women go through it with no insurance,"

said Fite.

Fite attended Jacksonville State University, and serves on the Legislative Committees of Education Policy, Government Operations and Tourism and Travel. He and his wife, Judy are the proud parents of four children.

Thank you Representative Fite that you are a person whom God brought through the fire and now you are offering HOPE to those who would come after you and your beloved, Judy.

Only after storms of suffering have shaped us, can we do the work that now defines us, the work of Steel Magnolias. Marti and I were talking to the daughter, an uninsured woman, about the bill, HB147, we had inspired Representative Lea Fite to refile for the 2009 general session. Sometimes, it takes only a warm smile and compassionate eye contact to convey HOPE to a cancer patient.

Steel Magnolias are grateful to Ginny Campbell for being our voice in the committee meeting. Rep. Fite praised Ginny for her presentation. Rep. Fite also praised Dr. Donald Williamson, State Health Officer for his presentation. Rep. Fite said as much as he has talked about this loophole in the MBCCTA, it took a breast cancer patient, in treatment, who had started her journey at the health department to unmask the problem, with this treatment program. Rep. Fite said that the chairman of this committee asked Dr. Williamson, "If this same woman, with this same cancer, had been diagnosed before going to the health department, her bills would not be paid?" Dr. Williamson replied, "You have got it! That is exactly what we are saying."

Marti asked Jeanne, the mother of Claire, a young woman whose diagnoses of cancer, became a calling to help other young breast cancer patients, how it felt to have a daughter diagnosed with breast cancer. Jeanne said that she stayed two weeks with her daughter, who lives in Jefferson County. She told about what she did to help and she gave such a wonderful tribute to her young son-in law. Jeanne said that when her daughter's husband of one year, got home from work, he wanted to take over Claire's care, emptying drain bottles, etc.

We have seen pictures of Claire, never met her or her young husband but they are certainly what it takes to be a Steel Magnolia and a Man of Steel.

Molly Grogan brought her daughter and granddaughter to the March meeting. It is always a joy to see families being so supportive of their loved one. We were also shared fellowship with Stringfellow Hospital nurse, Valerie Barclay.

What is Colloid Carcinoma?

Great question!

First, let's discuss what cancer is. A cancerous cell is one that escapes the normal controls on cell growth, reproduction and death. Normal cells are born, reproduce a couple of times, serve their purpose and die. A cancer cell never dies. It just keeps reproducing itself over and over and over again. Having lost the higher mechanics of the normal cell, the cancer cell has "de-differentiated" or taken a step back in the development process.

In fact, the more immature a cell is, the more aggressive the cancer, in general. The pathologist calls it "undifferentiated" or "poorly differentiated" meaning that it is so many steps back in the maturation process that he can't tell what type of cell it was to begin with.

Most breast cancers are infiltrating ductal carcinomas. This variant which makes up 60-70% of all breast cancers starts in the ductal system of the normal breast. The second most common type, between 10-15% of cancers, is infiltrating lobular carcinoma, which is derived from cells in the breast lobules. The rest of the cancers fall into a few categories based on how they have differentiated. That means that they are derived from the ductal cells, but as they are more differentiated, they are less aggressive.

Colloid carcinoma represents 2-3% of all breast cancers. It is one of these well-differentiated types, and is characterized by the secretion of mucin. For that reason it is also known as mucinous carcinoma. It is a low grade tumor with very good prognosis.

Papillary carcinoma and tubular carcinoma are two other rare variant that follow the same rule—more well differentiated and less aggressive. Medullary carcinoma is also a rare form of breast cancer, and in general is better differentiated, but often is ER and PR receptor negative, and is therefore actually more difficult to keep under control.

Triple-Negative Breast Cancer

The University of Alabama at Birmingham Comprehensive Cancer Center has received a 6.4 million dollar grant to evaluate experimental drugs in combination with standard therapies to treat triple-negative tumors. The grant is from the Susan G. Komen For The Cure Foundation and the Triple-Negative Cancer Foundation.

Dr. Ellen Spremulli will attend a conference in mid May, specifically on Triple-Negative Breast Cancer. She will obtain all the latest information. Dr. Spremulli plans to write, for Steel Magnolias, an article, concerning what she learns at the conference.

The Love/Avon Army of Women

In October 2008, the Dr. Susan Love Research Foundation and the Avon Foundation for Women launched a groundbreaking iniative that is partnering women with breast cancer researchers to find the key to what causes breast cancer by giving women a new way to learn about and sign-up for breast research studies. Exciting Times At RMC

Drive To Close the Loophole!!

Steel Magnolias Breast Cancer Support Group, whose office is in the RMC West Building, on the first day of the 2009, Regular Session of the Alabama Legislature, mailed letters to every member of the Alabama Senate, asking their support for HB 147, a bill submitted in 2008, by Representative Lea Fite and pre-filed once again this year. Steel Magnolias has worked feverously, from our RMC West office, addressing envelopes to legislators and mailing personal letters and the Steel Magnolias Newsletter: February, March and the first two pages of the April 20 issue. As of today, Saturday, April 18, HB147 has received unanimous yes votes in the House Government Appropriations Committee, the full House and the Senate Health Committee. One hurdle remains, a vote in the full Senate. Lenora Johnson, Executive Director of Steel Magnolias called Governor Riley's office and requested that if the bill passes the Senate, that Gov. Riley come to Anniston to sign the bill into law. I was told that this request was being sent to Gov. Riley's scheduling secretary. I asked to have a few days notice so that RMC and Steel Magnolias can plan a reception and arrange to have the uninsured Heflin woman, Sarah O'Dell, who in 2005 called Steel Magnolias for help, raising red flags and starting the research that brought us to this day, present for the signing of HB147. If HB147 becomes law, uninsured, qualifying, breast and cervical cancer patients will no longer have to see a nurse practitioner at the public health department before being diagnosed by a doctor to be enrolled in the Medicaid Breast and Cervical Cancer Treatment program.

RMC Earns Full Accreditation

RMC had been accredited for 51 years, since the Joint Commission's inception, a stringent process that never compromises patient care, before losing it during the commission's August visit. In August, 22 areas were identified that needed improvement. Judy Whaley, RMC director of accreditation said, "Having the Joint Commission approval is voluntary, but it's also vital to a hospital's survival." On April 1, because of much hard work, RMC achieved the Gold Standard, and was given full accreditation by the Joint Commission.

J. David McCormick, President and CEO at RMC

On May 15, 2009, David McCormick will become Administrator of NEARMC. McCormick replaces 25 year administrator, Allen Fletcher, who retired in August, 2008. David McCormick was selected from a pool of 95 candidates, spanning coast to coast. McCormick comes to RMC, a proven leader, with 30 years experience as chief executive officer. It is with great anticipation that everyone associated with RMC awaits the arrival of Regional Medical Center's new president and CEO.


