No Time for Heroics

The national statistic is that Alabama ranks 6th in the nation in cancer deaths! And, yet every one I know delays in asking their doctor for testing that would offer early cancer diagnosis, including me.

When diagnosed with breast cancer in 1999, it had been 3 years since my last mammogram and I was even beginning to see a difference in the size of my breast and the shape of my nipple. Still, I was not stirred to action! This is just the first of several mistakes I know I made. Doctors take their direction from us, sad to say, because we think they will direct us toward needed screening.

At UAB, my sister was recently diagnosed with Cholangiocarcinoma, (Bile Duct cancer), rare in the USA, more often diagnosed in India and other less developed countries. It made me think of an episode in my own life. When I approached my 5th anniversary of being diagnosed with primary breast can-

cer. I asked Dr. Spremulli to order a PET scan.

PET and CAT Scan

For six months, preceding my 5th year of survivorship, I felt very strongly that I needed a PET scan. I wasn't feeling any negative symptoms, I just wanted to cover all the bases before I marked this date. I felt absolutely certain, as did my oncologist, that I would have a negative result. After all, I looked very healthy and I am what some might call a trooper. Dr. Spremulli and I were both in disbelief when my screening revealed multiple hot spots in my thoracic area, one on a lung. After a visit with my general surgeon, Dr. Wesley Smith, the decision was made to consult Dr. Robert J. Cerfolio at UAB.


After careful study of both my CAT and PET scans, Dr. Cerfolio told me that both test revealed two lymph nodes, on either side of my wind pipe that showed hot on both the CAT and PET. He went on to say it was his gut feeling that the lymph

nodes were benign, however we wouldn't know 100% until we took a biopsy. The decision was made to biopsy the nodes. The nodes were cancer free, they however were very large and entangled with blood vessels.

Some might ask,
"Would you take the test
again?" The answer is,
"YES!" We have to be
willing to look inside if
we are ever to have early
detection. When any of
us begins to experience
symptoms that are different from our day to day
feelings, we must ask a
qualified doctor to order
testing.

Regardless of where we grew into adulthood or where we have lived in the years since becoming adults, we have all, at some time been exposed to potentially harmful microorganisms, or to chemical contamination. We can choose to ruin our lives with worry, or we can choose, with prudence, by faith, to live our lives as fully as possible, recognizing that we live in a contaminated world.

What had caused so much damage to my thoracic lymph nodes? Histoplasmosis. I asked Dr.

Cerfolio, "And what is that!?" His answer was shocking and took me back to the late summer and fall of 1963. On July 3, of 1963, my family moved from Immokalee, FL, to Anniston, AL. When I had trouble finding work, I took a summer job, gathering eggs on a Walley Milling Co. breeder farm. Being an uninsured woman, fresh from the Big Cypress Swamp, accustomed to dealing with what ever, without professional help, I didn't see a doctor about the cough that lasted for months. Little did I know that my immune system was waging a war for my life. Had I not had a strong immune system, this fungus could have taken my life. I encourage everyone to research Histoplasmosis. Fear prevents many of us from getting mammograms, sonograms, and other diagnostic testing. Burying our heads in the sand does not change the reality of a situation. God designed our bodies with an alarm system. As we all know, an alarm works only when there is a positive response to the alarm. I admonish everyone, listen to your bodies! You are fearfully and wonderfully made! Please don't ignore God's alarm systems!

Hebrews 11:1 Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. **College Dictionary** The feeling that what is desired is also possible, or that events may turn out for the best.

Those of us who believe that the Bible is the inspired Word of God, believe that the promise of Hebrews 11:1, is not wishful thinking but hope supported by evidence that is grounded in our faith in our creator.

Having just learned that one of my precious siblings is facing a battle with cancer, I sought something that would be a comfort to her and to every newly diagnosed cancer patient.

Dr. Dave Roberts, Steel Magnolias Board Chairman, in July, 2004, at our first New Beginnings Banquet, delivered this powerful speech.

Maintain Your Hope What does hope mean? Most of you can tell me what hope means to you. Hope means that the insurance company will pay for the next procedures they need. Hope means that this disease will not infect your families. It has been said that, "True hope is inadvertent. It does not come from searching for hope. It grows out of two basic convictions: that God is in charge and that He intervenes."

For me, hope means a promise for a bright future in spite of the circumstances around me. The apostle Paul wrote to the church in Rome, "In hope we have been saved, but hope that is seen is not hope; for who hopes for what he already sees? But if we hope for what we do not see, with perseverance we wait eagerly for it."

Hope is necessary in every condition. The miseries of poverty, war, captivity, and especially terminal disease would without comfort, be insupportable. Hope means knowing that others care. Many Christians have been and are continuing to pray for all of you. Nothing brings greater strength and comfort than to know and even hear someone say, "I am praying for you."

Abraham Lincoln said, "I have been driven many times to my knees, by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere to go but prayer. My own wisdom, and that of all about, seemed insufficient for the day."

Hope also means knowing God cares. In spite of the circumstances, regardless of the problems we may be going through, we have to know God is still in control. The Psalmist reminds us in Psalm 42:5—"Why are you in despair, O my soul? And why have you become disturbed within me? Hope in God, for I shall again praise Him for the help of His presence."

The circumstances that God allows in our lives are intended for His purpose for us. Tribulations increase our patience, which in turn builds character, which produces hope as a result of God's love being poured into our hearts. Here are a few tips:

Keep On Being Happy and Hopeful! Learn to laugh with other people and learn to laugh at yourself as well. Enjoy the comic side of life when it comes and bookmark them so you can revisit them often. In this, guard your spare moments. They are like uncut diamonds. Discard them and their value will never be known. Improve them and they will become the brightest gems in useful life.

Concentrate on Living! Focus on the positives and not the negatives. Try not to focus on what you can't do and focus on what you can do. You can have fun with your family and friends. You can participate in some type of activity with others that keeps you going. Larry Burkett lost a shoulder and a kidney to cancer. Through that he still

played golf when he could. He said he liked to play even though he couldn't play very well. His brother told him, "It's okay that you don't play very well now, because you didn't play all that well before!" That inspired Larry to keep on playing!

Accentuate The Positive! Overall, hope means maintaining a positive attitude. Songwriter, Johnny Mercer, died in 1976 from a brain tumor. In his mid 40's on his way home from a session with a psychiatrist, he decided to take his doctor's suggestion to, "Accentuate the Positive," and he turned it into a song. One of the lines goes like this: "You've got to accentuate the positive, eliminate the negative, latch on to the affirmative, and don't mess with Mr. Inbetween." That's good counsel! While you or a loved one is struggling through a difficult time, do the things that will help you maintain a positive attitude.

Our hope has been guaranteed in God's word: Hebrews 6: 17-20 tells us, "God is desiring even more to show to the heirs of the promise the unchangeableness of His purpose, interposed with an oath, so that by two unchangeable things in which it is impossible for God to lie, we who have taken refuge would have strong encouragement to take hold of the hope set before us. This hope we have as an anchor of the soul, a hope both sure and steadfast and one which enters the veil, where Jesus has entered as a forerunner for us, having become a high priest forever."

God knows what you need. Don't give up and try to satisfy that need your own way. Wait on Him, and He will take care of you according to His goodness. Maintain the hope God has implanted in your heart through the Holy Spirit, because it is a sure and steadfast hope that will serve you well as a solid anchor for your soul. Our bodies are like the slogan for Timex watches, "They take a lickin' and keep on ticking." That's what God wants for all of us: TO KEEP ON TICKING. So focus on staying alive and well. You still have a lot of ticking to do!

....TRICARE covers breast cancer MRI's for high risk patients....

Falls Church, VA— Recognizing the importance of early detection, TRCARE has changed its policy adding coverage for Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) screening for women at HIGH RISK of developing breast cancer. Anyone who meets the criteria for a breast MRI will be covered by TRICARE, retroactive to March 1, 2007. If any qualified beneficiaries received this care on or after that date and it was denied, they can submit their claim for reimbursement. The American Cancer society has guidelines defining high risk which doctors can use to determine who qualifies for the coverage. Breast cancer is the third most common cancer among TRICARE beneficiaries and the second most common cause of cancer death for U.S. women. An individual's level of risk can be impacted by a number of factors including age, family history and race.

Dear Mrs. Johnson, Thank you for your letter regarding the loophole in the Alabama Breast and Cervical Medicaid Treatment Act. Having been personally affected by this devastating disease, I certainly understand the importance of early detection programs and believe they save lives. As you know, in order to address this loophole issue, Alabama State Law must be modified. I understand you are currently working with Representative Lea Fite and encourage you to continue working with him and the Alabama Department of Health, which administers the program. To facilitate your efforts, I have forwarded your letter to the Alabama Department of Public Health and to the Alabama Medicaid Agency. I applaud your dedication and efforts to help cancer victims and appreciate your personal comments in your letter. Whenever I can be of assistance to you in the future, please do not hesitate to contact my office. Sincerely, Bob Riley, Governor..... Montgomery, AL

(UPDATE) Representative Lea Fite introduced a bill, that if passed, would restore Alabama's matching funds to the Public Health Dept.'s CDC Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program and close the loophole that has existed in the Breast and Cervical Cancer Treatment Act since 2001. This would give poor, uninsured Alabama women the same level of care given to qualifying women in Georgia and Mississippi.

(UPDATE) The Governor's office has restored, matching funds, totaling \$400,000, to the proposed budget for the CDC Early Screening Program. This still needs legislative approval.

Margaret Taylor and Marti Warren also received letters of response to the letters they wrote to Gov. Riley. As with my letter, he sent their letters to Representative Fite, Dr. Williamson @ Alabama Public Health, and to Medicaid. We all received responses from Dr. Donald E. Williamson, M.D. State Health Officer....Montgomery
